Trees AT Device Center - Open Lab Days



We maintain an Assistive Technology (AT) Device Center for use by students and families. AT is any item, piece of equipment, software or product system that is used to increase, maintain, or improve the functional capabilities of individuals with disabilities (IDEA, 2004). AT can range from low technology (such as a pencil grip) to high technology (speech recognition software). This spring, the AT Device Center will host Open Lab Days on Mondays from 9:00 am - 3:00 pm. The Device Center will be open to the public without an appointment. Visitors can explore a variety of assistive technology, including adapted computer equipment, communication devices, and switch-friendly apps and toys. Staff will be available to answer questions; however, individualized support is dependent on the number of participants. Appointments are also available. Featured Artificial Intelligence (AI)

We have seen a lot of information in the news about artificial intelligence. There are various software applications and websites that utilize artificial intelligence programming. Many of these applications have the potential to support individuals with disabilities. We thought it might be helpful if we highlighted one of these Al applications each month. This month we are highlighting Al for writing.

- Ember.ly AI (https://ember.ly/app/home) helps in the brainstorming or prewriting phase of writing. It creates a template graphic organizer based on your query or topic, i.e. for the topic 'assistive technology in an online environment' it generates a graphic organizer with six topics and subtopics. The program allows the user to add links or resources to support the topics/subtopics.
- **Grammarly AI** (https://www.grammarly.com/) is a commonly used writing assistant which checks a writing sample for grammar, spelling, etc.
- AHREF (https://ahrefs.com/writing-tools) is an AI tool for editing or revising content. It can enhance your writing by changing the writing style or tone, paraphrase, and check grammar and punctuation.

Experts will discuss how PA ABLE Savings Program and Social Security Disability Programs work together. You'll hear from Diana Fishlock, outreach specialist for the PA ABLE Savings Program, and Frank Magni, Social Security Administration public affairs specialist. The PA ABLE Savings Program gives individuals with qualified disabilities a way to save for disability-related expenses while maintaining important benefits and supporting health, independence, and quality of life. The Social Security Administration's Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program pays benefits to adults and children who meet requirements for a qualifying disability and have limited income and resources.

The Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) program pays benefits to individuals and certain family members if the individual is "insured." While these two programs are different, the medical requirements are the same. Traditionally people receiving such benefits could only save a small amount, but ABLE accounts change the landscape, allowing people receiving these benefits to save for a house, a car, and other everyday expenses. 
Speech and Language Family Meeting Summary
