We have picked the book <u>Hacking the Code</u>: The <u>Ziggety Zaggety Road of a D-Kid</u> by Gea Meijering for our next book club. <u>Hacking the Code</u> is a relatable illustrated chapter book that highlights the journey of Kees, a child with dyslexia whose perseverance, creativity, and friendships help him discover his own strengths. Kees is good at science experiments, fixing things that are broken, making friends, and especially pulling clever pranks. However, due to his dyslexia, his spelling and writing aren't exactly his strengths. One prank goes too far and Kees finds himself punished with the worst assignment ever - writing an essay about the hardest thing he's ever done. Kees must figure out how to tell his story and discover why his way of thinking is something to be proud of.

Join us to read about Kees as he navigates school, activities, and friendships. This book is recommended for children ages 8-12 but is a great read for all ages. We will meet for four weeks virtually Tuesdays from 6:00 - 7:00 pm. *A hard copy of the book will be provided to all participants who register by Wednesday, December 17, 2025.*

Parent and Family Support Meeting Survey





Trees Assistive Technology Device Center Open Lab Days

The Trees Network maintains an Assistive Technology (AT) Device Center for use by students and families. AT is any item, piece of equipment, software or product system that is used to increase, maintain, or improve the functional capabilities of individuals with disabilities (IDEA, 2004). AT can range from low technology (such as a pencil grip) to high technology (speech recognition software). The AT Device Center hosts Open Lab Days on **Wednesdays from 9:00 am - 3:00 pm**. The Device



Center will be open to the public without an appointment. Visitors can explore a variety of AT, including adapted computer equipment, communication devices, and switch-friendly apps and toys. Staff will be available to answer questions; however, individualized support is dependent on the number of participants. Appointments are also available. Come to RMU, Patrick Henry 333 and check out the various devices. Please note that the AT Lab will be closed during RMU's winter break from December 15th, 2025 - January 19th, 2026.



Featured Artificial Intelligence (AI)

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is becoming an integral part of education, transforming how students learn and how teachers teach. One of its most powerful uses is in creating personalized experiences. The following AI tools are designed to help students with speech disabilities and for students who are nonspeaking or nonverbal.

- https://www.monks.com/case-studies/my-first-voice-innovation-generative-ai My First Voice, an Al-powered platform, transforms children's unique sounds and personalizes authentic speech.
- https://seamlesscare.ie/empathic/ **Empathic** app has been developed for nonverbal people. You can add up to three nonverbal users and share Empathic with 20 Companion users. Companion users can check the emotions of the nonverbal person.
